

In Flanders fields.

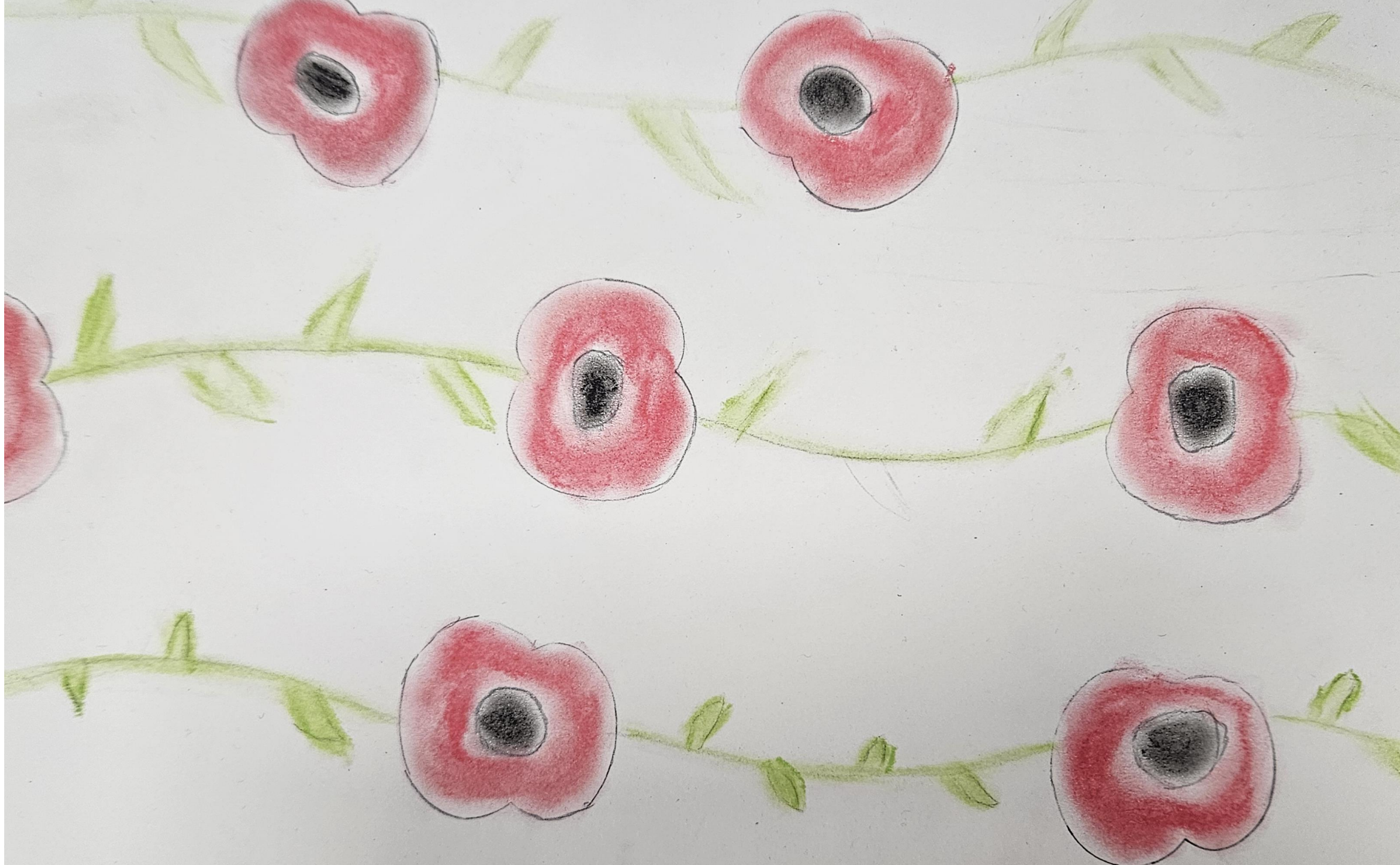
Take up our quarrel with the foe:
